Extension of Funding Drawdown dates for Town and Village Renewal Scheme, CLÁR and Rural Recreation Scheme

The drawdown dates in respect of funding under the Town & Village Renewal Scheme, CLAR and Rural Recreation Scheme have been extended by the Department following a request from the Council. The request was made, given the need for community engagement and mobilisation, the statutory Planning Permission and Part 8 processes, public procurement and other statutory consents. All requests for extensions have been approved, on the condition that the initial tranche of funding be drawn down no later than the 15thMarch 2018 and the project fully completed and all funding drawn down by end March 2019. Please note that the condition whereby 65% of all funding received under each of the listed schemes (i.e. Town and Village Renewal Scheme/ CLÁR/Rural Recreation Scheme) in 2016 be expended prior to release of 2017 funding still stands. The Council will be communicating the timelines to all relevant community groups.

Town Renewal Plans Callan and Inistinge.

Meetings have been held with local communities in Callan and Inistioge at which briefings were provided on the town renewal framework and on the formation of local Town Renewal Teams. Both of these serve as the first steps in a process of community engagement in the preparation of town renewal plans for their respective areas.

Thomastown-Age Friendly Town.

It is an objective of the Kilkenny Age Friendly Strategy 2017-2022 to establish Thomastown, Graiguenamanagh and Thomastown as Age Friendly Towns. Callan is already an Age Friendly Town. The first meeting of the Thomastown Age Friendly Committee took place

30th November 2017. The multi- agency committee was briefed at its first meeting on the concept of an age friendly town and the process by which it will be achieved, including the preparation of an age friendly action plan.

Healthy Ireland Funding

Healthy Ireland Initiative- The LCDC was successful in securing €89,000 under Healthy Ireland funding in respect of 5 projects including the preparation of a strategic plan for the County and a Regional "Smoking Cessation" campaign as follows:

LOCAL ENTERPRISE OFFICE (LEO) UPDATE

- A total of 51 training programmes were organised by the LEO in 2017 with 533 clients participating in these core programmes.
- There were 7 seminars run with a total of 356 attendees, 3 of which had a regional focus: Trading Online, Enterprise Ireland and Network Ireland's Fuelling Ambition: Steps to Success Roadshow South East Event for female entrepreneurs; National Women's Enterprise Day. Other seminars included Take it to the Banks and the Implications of Brexit. An Introduction to Public Procurement for Sole Traders and Small Businesses: Countdown to the New EU General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR) and IT Security and Supports & Funding Opportunities for Start-Up Businesses.
- The LEO ran 5 Start your Own Business Courses (SYOBC) with a total of 111

participants including a Start your Own Food Business Course and a SYOBC specifically conjunction developed in with Department of Social Protection for potential applicants interested in the Back to Enterprise Allowance Scheme or Short Term Enterprise Allowance Scheme.

- A total of 11 participants completed the flagship Owner Manager Development Programme with Blaise Brosnan, certified by IT Carlow.
- A total of 13 craft and design producers participated on the "Create Kilkenny" producer development programme with 3 businesses representing Kilkenny Showcase in January 2018.
- The LEO has approved €458,643 to 24 projects - 4 Feasibility/Innovation Grants; 7 Priming Grants and 13 Business Expansion Grants contributing to the direct creation of 37 jobs with the associated business projecting the creation of 91 jobs in the next three years.
- 25 Trading Online Vouchers have been approved to a value of €52,440 with 3 further applications pending approval by the LEO Evaluations Committee.
- Smart Options Loan scheme 14 applications were referred to the LEO from St. Canice's Credit Union during 2017, with 9 approvals (72%), 2 withdrawn, 2 declined and 1 deferral. A total of €295,000 was awarded to the 9 applications.
- Eight businesses have been assisted with preparing loan applications submitted to Micro Finance Ireland.
- 320 Mentoring assignments have been allocated to businesses across a range to topics including finance, marketing, sales, business planning and digital media.
- 15 one-to-one mentoring marketing and finance clinics have been held during 2017 with a total of 76 participants.

- 396 people have availed of one-to-one business advisory sessions;
- 11 businesses have been approved Technical Assistance for Micro Exporters grant assistance totalling €16,266.
- Minister of State at the Department of Enterprise, Innovation and Employment, Pat Breen and Minister of State at the Department of Housing and Local Government, John Paul Phelan visited the offices of LEO Kilkenny at the end of November to meet some clients and to discuss issues the face.

ROADS:


The following serves as an update to Elected Members on some of the Capital projects currently ongoing in County Kilkenny:-

N25 New Ross Bypass

Transport Infrastructure Ireland awarded the PPP Contract to a BAM Iridium consortium (the PPP Co.) on 26th January 2016. The PPP Co's contractor for the works is a BAM Civil Ltd and Dragados Ireland Ltd joint venture (New Ross Joint Venture – NRJV). The works are progressing well and the road remains on programme to open in 2019.



Earthworks operations are over 85% complete with in excess of 1 million m³ of bulk earthworks excavated and re-used to date. Rock blasting operations are complete at Ballyverneen (Glenmore) and along the N30 section, and will be completed at Stokestown and Camlin in the coming weeks. Drainage, accommodation works, services works and other associated works are also progressing well. The construction of the bridge deck for the approach spans of the Barrow Bridge on the Pink Rock side (Kilkenny side)

continue to progress. In the coming months the approach spans on both sides of the river and the 3 central towers will be progressed in preparation

for the construction of the 2 main bridge spans.



Works continue to progress on Glenmore Road Underpass, temporary diversions and statutory 60km/h speed limits continue to operate on the N25 Waterford Road at Glenmore. The Pink Rock Road in Co. Kilkenny remains closed to facilitate Barrow Bridge access and construction. A temporary diversion route and traffic management plan will remain in place until June 2018.

Housing:

Private Grants

Housing Aid for Older Persons Grant (HOP) Scheme 2018: The Housing Aid for Older Persons is a grant to assist older people over 66 years living in poor housing conditions mainly covering rewiring and re-roofing and is assessed in-house by technical staff. Due to limited funding and increasing numbers of applications the Council has decided again to advertise the scheme giving a 6 week window for receipt of applications starting 30th October 2017 to Friday 11th December 2017. This date is now extended to Friday 29th December at 12 noon. The other two grant schemes based on medical need remain open.

Rent Review 2018

Members are reminded of the pending rent review to be carried out in 2018 for all our tenants.

PLANNING:

Forward Planning:

- The Draft Local Area Plan for Castlecomer public display period ended on the 17th November. A total of 28 submissions were received. The Chief Executive's report on the submissions received to the Draft is currently under preparation and will be brought to the January Council Meeting.
- A total of 9 submissions were received to the Proposed Material Alterations to the Draft

- Ferrybank/Belview Local Area Plan. The Chief Executive's report will be brought to the December Council meeting.
- Work is ongoing on the process of putting sites on the Vacant Sites Register, and owners are now being notified that their sites are on the Register. They can now appeal to An Bord Pleanála.
- The Draft Urban Design Code for the Abbey Quarter was published on the 24th November and submissions will be accepted until Friday 22nd December 2017. An Information Evening was held on the 30th November in the Maltings and this was well attended.
- The Draft Planning Scheme for the North Quays Strategic Development Zone was published by Waterford County Council in October for public consultation. The closing date for submissions was the 30th November. The Council's Chief Executive made a submission to this process.
- The Chief Executive also made a submission on behalf of Kilkenny County Council to the Draft National Planning Framework on the 10th November. A copy of the submission was forwarded to the members.
- The Planning Department inputted into a joint local authority South East Regional submission to the National Planning Framework. This was submitted also on the 10th of November.
- The Department of Culture, Heritage and the Gaeltacht (DCHG) have announced the continuing of conservation grants for 2018. Similar to last year, the grants will be administered by the Conservation Office of Kilkenny County Council and will be divided into two funding streams: the Built Heritage Investment Scheme and the Structures at Risk Fund. Kilkenny County Council received an allocation of €88,000 under the Built Heritage Investment Scheme. This grant funding will provide assistance to owners of protected structures, proposed protected structures and structures in Architectural Conservation Areas, or within the Amenity of a National Monument

in carrying out conservation works. The Structures at Risk Fund assists with works to safeguard structures eligible for or proposed for inclusion in the Record of Protected structures and in certain cases safeguard structures within Architectural Conservation Areas. Under the Structures at Risk Fund, Kilkenny County Council may submit 5 applications to the DCHG for consideration, of which, one may be for an Irish Historic House in private ownership. Guidance Documents and Application Forms for both schemes are available on the Conservation section the of Department page of Kilkenny County Counci website, and the front desk of the Planning Department of County Hall. Completed Applications Forms are to be posted to the Conservation Officer, Kilkenny County Council not later than the 31st January 2018. Further assistance may be acquired by contacted the Conservation Officer directly.


Civic Amenity Site in South Kilkenny

Kilkenny's Culture and Creativity Plan Delivered

Kilkenny's Culture and Creativity Plan 2017 has been successfully delivered by Kilkenny Cultural Services (Heritage, Arts, Architecture, Conservation and Libraries) with funding of £64,000 awarded by the Department of Culture, Heritage and the Gaeltacht, and the Department of Housing, Planning and Local Government. 11 projects received funding - Bookville, Kilkenny Field Name Project, Fairytale Festival, Bealtaine,

Cruinnui na Casca, Kilkenny Famine Experience, Rhyme Rag Ensemble, Consuming Project, Mayfair Memories, County Kilkenny Cultural Strategy. A new Kilkenny Culture and Creativity Plan 2018-2023 will be developed in early 2018.



Graveyard Inscriptions available online

The Heritage Office provided support and funding to Kilkenny Archaeological Society (KAS) to digitise headstone inscriptions from 33 graveyards in County Kilkenny. The headstones in over 100 graveyards had previously been recorded by KAS volunteers in the 1970's and were available in hard copies only. The inscriptions are now publically available online, in searchable pdf format, at <a href="http://kilkennyarchaeologicalsociety.ie/library/archaeologicalsocie

This includes inscriptions from the following graveyards Ballycallan, Ballyreddin, Bawnfadda, Bealborr, Castleinch, Clara Church, Clashacrow, Dunmore Old, Dysart, Freneystown, Grove, Johnswell, Kells Priory, St Kierans Kells, Kilfera Kilmademoge, Sheestown, Kilree, Kyleballykeefe, Kylebeg, St Lachtains Old, Maddoxtown, St Mauls, Mickles Dama, Mothel, Odagh, Outrath, Park, Rathcoole, Stoneycarthy, Templemartin, Thornback, Three castles, Tullamaine. It is hoped to digitise the remaining records in the coming years.

Community Engagement & Education

- Fire Safety in the home talks/demonstrations have been delivered to various community groups including, Text alert AGM, Older Peoples Forum, Mental Health Week in MacDonagh Junction, Information Fair in Kilmacow, Health and Wellbeing talk by GAA.
- At Halloween Fire Personnel from Kilkenny Fire and Rescue Service co-presented HALLOWEEN SAFETY message with An Garda Siochána to over 850 5th year students via 9 no. presentations in three schools in Kilkenny. The safety message delivered was focused on Halloween safety, bonfires, fireworks and burns reinforcing the negative side of fireworks outlining injuries sustained.
- 2 Home Fire Safety Visits were carried out with vulnerable people in our communities

Influencing and Regulating the built environment

- 92 no. Fire Safety Certificate Applications processed
- 102 inspections of premises under the KFRS

Facilities and Service Improvements.

- Positions for Retained Firefighters in Thomastown and Castlecomer Fire Brigades advertised.
- We continue to upgrade facilities in all fire stations including provision for energy efficiency measures in Freshford Fire Station.
- Planned upgrade of fire service vehicles continues with 1 second hand fire engine due before Christmas for Graiguenamanagh Fire Brigade.
- The new fire station for Graiguenamanagh Fire Brigade is nearing completion stage. It is due to be completed by the end of February 2018.



The bank overdraft facility has not been utilized during the eleven months to the end of November.
